SOB Team Wins International Competition

The John H Watson Society has announced the winners of the 2014 John H Watson World Invitational Canonical Treasure Hunt. High Honours were earned by **Team SOB**. This *Sign of Four* included three SOBS—**Sheila Holtgrieve**, **Airy Maher** and **me**—and **Melissa Anderson** of The Hansoms of John Clay (Peoria, IL). Our team successfully answered a 150-question Sherlockian quiz, billed as possibly the most difficult Sherlockian quiz in history. We competed against teams from various European countries for team honours. ☞ Everyone had to submit a fully-completed quiz: Participation required an answer to every question and had to have a correct answer on the final question, to be considered a viable entry. We had the month of August to work, and **Team SOB** submitted a viable entry on August 25—a week ahead of the deadline. The quiz involved encryption, obscure references, geographic and biologic inferences, people, objects, dates, unique terminology, and all manner of Sherlockian scholarship. ☞ The SOB team won the 2013 inaugural treasure hunt in August 2013 with 100% accuracy on 100 questions and had to work vigorously to repeat the win: The expanded and more difficult 2014 quiz required approximately 200 man-hours of research and problem-solving to complete. SOB team members Sheila, Airy and Margie practiced their skills by participating in the weekly JHWS quizzes,

where they took first place in the team competition in all 30 of the 2014 weekly quizzes. Melissa competed during the year in the weekly individual quiz competition, winning many of them; she joined **Team SOB** for the treasure hunt as The Hansoms scion was not fielding a team for 2014. ☞ The team would like to extend their thanks to David & Terri Haugen and my son Jeremy Flores for their support during the treasure hunt. 🍵

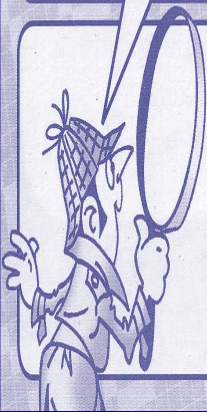
Ch...ch...ch...CHANGES!!

10 further stories (in *The Casebook of Sherlock Holmes*) published between 1923 and 1927, are still protected by US copyright, which expires in December 2022.

“If you proceed instead to bring out *Study in Sherlock II* unlicensed, do not expect to see it offered for sale by Amazon, Barnes & Noble and similar retailers,” the Doyle estate threatened.

Meanwhile, Klinger has petitioned the courts to require the estate to pay his legal fees of \$70,000 (£40,929).

chip that can be tapped with any supporting phone to trigger a speech. “You don't need to download anything,...It's all about having a spontaneous moment. US Supreme Court Rejects Sherlock Copyright Case

The US Supreme Court refused to hear an emergency petition from the heirs of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, who are trying to stop the publication of a book based on Sherlock Holmes. Justice Elena Kagan dismissed the plea without explanation. The family say Les Klinger and Laurie R King should pay a licence fee for using Doyle's characters. An earlier appeals court decision ruled against the Scottish author's estate. The seventh circuit court of appeals in Chicago said that the character of Sherlock, along with 46 stories and four novels in which he has appeared, was in the public domain. Sir Arthur's estate

has argued this copyright protection means that anyone creating original stories based on Sherlock should pay for the privilege. Klinger handed over the \$5,000 (£2,923) licensing fee when he published *A Study in Sherlock: Stories Inspired by the Sherlock Holmes Canon*, in 2011. But when it came to publishing a second volume, he decided to withhold the money, leading Doyle's estate to threaten legal action. However, Klinger sued the estate first, arguing the characters were in the public domain and no fee was due. The appeals court sided with him on 16 June and now, it appears, the Supreme Court has agreed.

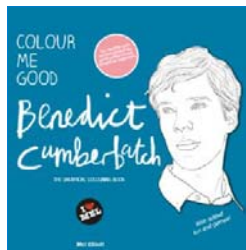

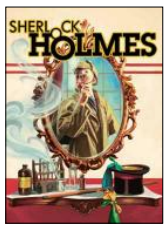
text read, "Apparently French women do col-

DC sez: I again apologize for the way in which this column has taken to living up to its title. I offer no excuse for abandoning the usual format of this intolerable scrawl. I made bold to query the editor of TWADDLE, and came away with what can only be styled as a homework assignment. So here goes;

Sherlock Holmes («Шерлок Холмс») Between 1979 and 1986, Soviet television produced a series of 5 films, split into 11 episodes, starring Vasily Livanov as Sherlock Holmes and Vitaly Solomin as Dr. Watson. Based on the stories by Doyle, and including some works that had never (at that time) been adapted before. Later, a cinematic adaptation was made based on the 1986 episodes. This film was called "the Twentieth Century Approaches."

DC sez: Who knew the Evil Empire had such high production values? In my Cold War childhood we were led to imagine that Russian TV was something akin to a snowy, distorted, slightly less interesting version of "the Farm Report". (Anyone who doesn't get that reference will just have to ask someone who has tried to watch rural television in the days before cable and satellite.)

OK, so my curiosity, which propelled purchase, was transmuted into gob-smacked amazement when I finally watched the series.



It's in Russian with subtitles and that may not be some folk's cup of tea, but WOW! While I admit I'm not enough of a Sherlockian to comment much on the adaptation of the text, I know great TV when I see it. I do have a few reservations about some of the actors and their performances, but again my lack of Russian may be the chief problem. But the fact is, I can't get my head around all these thin, fit Mycrofts! (By my count this is at least the 3rd.) Happily, Lastrade is still a self-important imbecile. Of this Holmes and Watson, they require no praise from me. ●

I now know that most of the Sherlockian community has heard of the "Russian Holmes", but have you been able to watch it before? Probably not, but now you can: My DVD set is on long-term loan to The SOBs' Lending Library.

Also, here are a few things falling under the title of "I hear of Sherlock everywhere..."

If you missed "How Sherlock Changed the World", it's now available from PBS video. **DC sez:** This title is, for those who have not seen it, a surprising bit of understatement and a must see for anyone who thinks Doyle was just a lucky hack (including me).

For those who have not seen the "Murdoch Mysteries" or, as it's sold in the US "The Artful Detective", I suggest you give it a go. I'm up to season four, and Sir Arthur has made 3 appearances thus far, and in the episode titled "A Study in Sherlock", the Great Detective himself puts in an appearance. I shan't elaborate, but Doyle is given a unique chance to come face-to-face with his creation. ● The series airs on the Ovation Network. For those without this convenience, you will have to resort to Netflix or Amazon.com.

DC sez: Some of you have heard me praise the M.D. Jr. Holmes series solely on the grittiness of their London. Well, there's another bit of grimy, authentically dirty turn-of-the-century drama out there now, in what is expected to be a long running Cinemax series credited with bringing Director Steven Soderbergh out of retirement. I've seen the first episode of "The Knick", and I'm hooked. But be warned, it's set in a hospital in 1900, so it's not for the squeamish. (Rumor has it that even the SFX grips were grossed out a bit.)
