Book Review

The Strand Magazine & Sherlock Holmes: The Two Fixed Points in a Changing World

By Robert Veld, 100 pages
Gasogene Books (2013) \$24.95

About every decade Sherlockian readers are treated to one volume that quickly establishes itself as a classic. We're living in that decade, and author Rob Veld has given us that book.


"The Strand Magazine & Sherlock Holmes" is a little gem. Veld's book began as a series of articles in a local (Sydney, Australia) Sherlockian society newsletter. Thankfully, he didn't stop there. Over several years Veld researched, wrote and revised—drawing on some of the top libraries and minds in the business—until the present work emerged. In it he tells the story you only *think* you know: How a young magazine happened to usher forth Mr. Sherlock Holmes, the greatest character ever to step out of its (or any) pages. The partnership between two extraordinary visionaries, writer Arthur Conan Doyle and *Strand* editor Herbert Greenough Smith reverberates into our own time. Veld is at his best when describing how their working arrangement warmed into a lifelong friendship. As with any and creative venture,

the collaboration had its ups and downs. When Conan Doyle veered from Holmes to spiritualism, for example, his "persistent editor threw various plots at the author in an attempt to stimulate his mind." Happily, the effort paid off with a legacy to us of six more Holmes stories!

Whenever possible, those who were there describe events in their own words. The business of running a magazine—securing investors, juggling press runs, managing a burgeoning circulation, and courting publicity—is flawlessly told. The illustrations Veld has chosen are crisp, with many presented in color. A bonus is the fine introduction by Strand historian Geraldine Beare.

With skill that belies his status as a new talent, Veld offers us a book that's part reference, part history, and even—to my way of thinking—part love story. It's a fresh classic you shouldn't miss.



Librarian's Corner

The PFL was so generous this past winter, giving many books and other Sherlockian items for us to include in the Club Library and our own libraries and collections. He has always asked me in advance to go through the boxes to select books to add to the Club Library to fill in gaps and to choose special editions or items that Club Members would enjoy. I hope I have been able to choose wisely! Here are three new additions from the Haugen collection:

Ronald B. DeWaal's **"The World Bibliography of Sherlock Holmes and Dr. Watson"** subtitled "A Classified and Annotated List of Materials Relating to Their Lives and Adventures." Wow! This is a 526-page large book divided into ten major sections. For example, Section I is "The Sacred Writings" (including Braille and shorthand editions—who knew?), Section II, "The Apocrypha", Section V, "The Writings about the Writings", Section VIII, "Games and Competitions", and Section X, "Parodies, Pastiches, Burlesques, Travesties, Satires". The entries in each section and subsection contain title, author, publisher, date, where the item is, if in a collection, periodical name, etc. This volume is a treasure trove for Sherlockians. It was published in 1974. The author's preface mentions that two 5-year supplements were planned. While we do not have either of those, they were published in 1980 and 1988 and are available at Amazon.com. I will bring this book to a couple of Club Meetings for Members to peruse. After this, please let me know if you want to check it out and I will bring it for you.


The second item new to our Library from the Haugen collection is a very nice pamphlet/chapbook done by Christopher Roden of Calabash Press in B.C. of **two of Julian Symons' Sherlockian short stories**. As most of you know, Symons was a prolific crime writer, editor of several mystery series, and the first president of the Arthur Conan Doyle Society. The two stories are just delightful.

Third is a 4-volume set of **"The Muppet Sherlock Holmes"**. I couldn't resist these. Each has an adventure featuring The Great Gonzo as Sherlock, Fozzie Bear as Watson, Kermit the Frog as Lestrade, and—you guessed it—Miss Piggy as Irene Adler. Sometimes we all need some laughs, don't we?

⇒ An interesting new venture is 221B Cellars (221B Cellars, Santa Rosa, CA 95409, USA), a joint effort of Don Libey (author of *The Autobiography of Sherlock Holmes*), Don Yates, BSI, and Joanne Yates. The website at www.221bcellars.com is full of temptations. Mr. Libey says: "We are offering limited (200 bottles) First Edition and numbered bottles of Sonoma County wines each year named for a Holmes adventure and featuring on the label the first edition book covers. The first year is 'A Study In Scarlet'. These are intended to be purchased by Sherlockians as

collectible editions and by scion societies as items to be auctioned for fund raising."

⇒ **Benedict Cumberbatch: Behind the Scenes** by Neil Simpson is now out as an e-book from Endeavour Press. Find it at: www.endeavourpress.com, or Kindle edition £1.99 (from Amazon.co.uk).

⇒ At the 2013 Edgar Awards banquet on 2 May, the Mystery Writers of America chose "*Sherlock: A Scandal in Belgravia*", written by Steven Moffat, as Best TV Episode ("Elementary: Child Predator", written by Peter Black, was also nominated) and "*The Scientific Sherlock Holmes*" by James O'Brien as Best Critical/Biographical work.

- **From Peter Blau:**

⇒ **Jonny Lee Miller's "Elementary"** has ended its season on CBS. (Per Entertainment Weekly, it was the 14th most popular show on network TV and was 21st in the 18 to 49 age group.) The series averaged 10.8 million viewers and was the most-watched new series. The DVD set for the first season (24 episodes) is now available at Amazon.

⇒ Variety reported (April 30) that CBS Interactive will produce an on-line series, "*Baker Street Irregulars*", based on "*Elementary*" that's due this fall and follows "a motley crew of characters who assist the modern-day Sherlock in solving cases with their unique talents," to air on www.cbs.com, where you can already watch "*Elementary*" and play a "3 Truths and a Lie" game to "see if you have what it takes to keep up with Sherlock."

⇒ The American edition of Guy Adams' "*Sherlock: The Casebook*" will be titled "*The Sherlock Files: The Official Companion to the Hit Television Series*", due from It Books in July is a fully-illustrated examination of the first six programs in the series, imaginatively written and with great humor, in the voice of Watson.

⇒ **Occasionally to Embellish** by Nicholas Utechin (Gasogene Books, \$18.95), which is modestly subtitled "some writings on Sherlock Holmes" is a collection of reprints of some of Nick's literate and often humorous scholarship, from 1969 through 2009. There are new postscripts to many of the pieces, and the book offers a fine look at how much fun can be found in Canonical criticism.


The July 30 posting reads:

Following the entry of a default order against the Defendant, Conan Doyle Estate, Ltd., Leslie Klinger has filed a Motion for Summary Judgment asking that the Court enter a judgment against the Estate. Although the Estate accepted service in this matter, it never filed a responsive pleading. As a result, Klinger's motion asserts, there are no material issues of fact in dispute and it is entitled to judgment as a matter of law. The motion has been noticed for hearing before the Court on August 6, 2013.

Critic Nick Rennison is a Sherlock Holmes expert with a special interest in the copycat sleuths who sprang up in his wake. So it is no surprise to find him pastiching Conan Doyle in *Carver's Quest* (Corvus, £12.99), the first of a projected series starring amateur archaeologist Adam Carver and his runtish manservant Quint. • It's entertaining stuff—knowing, but never too-knowing—and Rennison's love of Victorian slang reflects a broader linguistic flair. But the novel's shaggy-dog linearity and air of having been written off the top of Rennison's head merely underline Doyle's punchy concision, arguably the quality that has stopped the Holmes stories from dating as they might have done.
