

#### If This is December, This Must Be "Carbuncle"!

The December 13, 2010 Business Meeting of The Sound of the Baskervilles will begin at <u>6:00 p.m.</u> at T.S. McHugh's Public House (21 Mercer Street, Seattle, [206] 282-1910). The <u>social hour</u> starts at <u>5:00 p.m</u>.

Our story of the month is, of course, <u>The Adventure of the Blue Carbuncle</u>, published in the *Strand* Magazine in January 1892. **As a special treat**, **Treasurer Al Nelson will lead the story discussion and conduct the quiz!!** 

Says PFL David: When Watson calls upon Holmes to wish him the compliments of the season, Holmes asks him to deduce something about the owner of an old hat. It's Holmes' opinion that the hat represents no crime but "only one of those whimsical little incidents which will happen when you have four million human beings all jostling each other within the space of a few square miles." He must soon change his mind, for the commissionaire who recovered the hat <u>and a goose</u> returns to 221B with what he found in the goose. It is the Blue Carbuncle, a rare and valuable gem recently stolen. Follow Holmes and Watson as they attempt to reduce 4 million suspects to one in The Adventure of the Blue Carbuncle!

#### "Unofficial" Play Outing an Official Success!!

October 3 found 16 SOBs attending a matinee performance of the west coast premiere of "Sherlock Holmes and The Doom of Devilsmore", by C.P. Stancich, at the Lakewood Playhouse. Tim Shute made a great Holmes and David Phillips a solid Dr. Watson.

We met "unofficially" at a Panera Bread restaurant beforehand, where we corralled several tables to accommodate four convivial groups of SOBs, including east coast SOB Bill Mosteller and his pal, Sara.

Interesting aspects about this play that PFL David noted include:

- ⇒ Oscar Dove supposedly lived with and participated in two Adventures with Holmes before Watson arrived on the scene;
- ⇒ Most of the action takes place at Hurlstone, the estate of Reginald Musgrave;
- ⇒ This play occurs <u>after</u> the events of "The Musgrave Ritual", cause for Holmes' and

Watson's welcome to stay at Hurlstone; and

⇒ The ever-present coffin—out of which came bodies, both real and fake, dead and alive.

Geoff Jeffery said he had deduced the killer before the final act, but the PFL—true to his Watsonian roots—was surprised when Holmes identified the murderer. We should also correct here the fact that it was SOB Cara Cross (Geoff's wife)—not Geoff—who first spied info about this play for us!!!

Discussing the play outside the playhouse, many of us had a chance to meet the playwright, and to meet and talk with both Tim Shute and David Phillips.

The play got a good review from The News Tribune, which noted in particular the acting ("excellent") and the set, lighting and sound ("outstanding"). Not bad for Tacoma community theatre!!

#### Librarian's Corner

"It is a great thing to start life with a small number of really good books which are your very own." Sir Arthur Conan Doyle Happy Thanksgiving! So, who has time to read during the holiday season? What about audio books, especially if you are traveling by car? I've been a "reader" of audio books a long time, for car rides and at home with my knitting needles. Stories come alive when read aloud by a good reader.

I listened to two good readings of the Canon recently. First, Simon Prebble reading the Memoirs; I got a head start on MUSG and REIG. Second, a full dramatization (with dramatic "license" in scripting) of 12 stories read by Sir John Gielgud as Holmes, Sir Ralph Richardson as Watson, and even the great Orson Welles as Moriarty in FINA. Wow—it can't get much better than that. I found both of these at the Seattle Public Library. For those who still have a cassette player, our Lending Library has several sets: The Adventures read by Edward Hardwicke (Watson in the Jeremy Brett series); the four novellas done by BBC radio, featuring Clive Merrison and Michael Williams; four stories from the Memoirs read by Robert Hardy, and Lion's Mane/Mazarin Stone read by Edward Raleigh. These will be available for checkout at our December meeting. Happy listening!

• From SOB Bill Mason: My new book "Pursuing Sherlock Holmes" (Xlibris) is a collection of 14 of the popular, entertaining and thoroughly researched pieces I've produced over the years. Peter Blau said my articles are "nicely done, and more important, interesting and amus-

- Al Nelson and Lauren Stephens noted it and Ed Funk brought the August 20 Seattle Times' article to the September Meeting: ...regarding the status of Doyle's home "Undershaw". Doyle helped to design it and located it there so that the fresh breezes in Hindhead would have a restorative effect on his consumptive wife, Louise. Louise died in 1906 and Doyle sold the home in 1907. For decades the place served as a hotel. Since 2004 it has stood vacant. Most recently the Waverley Borough Council agreed to allow Undershaw to be divided into apartments. Campaigners had tried to get the site into the top tier of historical buildings. In a response to that request the government report noted of Doyle, "He cannot be said to be an author of the standing of, for example, Charles Dickens or Jane Austin". AS Al SO succinctly noted, "fighting words".

- ⇒ For those Members who have an interest in the silent movies starring Sherlock Holmes, there is a fascinating article on the subject at http://bioscopic.wordpress.com/2010/08/08/penand-pictures-no-8-arthur-conan-doyle/. The article discusses not only the movies themselves, but what the copyright problems were that Doyle faced. There is an interesting quote from ACD in Andrew Lycett's biography of him, in which ACD writes to another author, "Our rights is an asset which is rising in value, no one knows quite how much. English cinema's films are in their infancy, but promise well, and it is there that our hopes lie. Unhappily the higher literature of thought and pathos is handicapped as compared to mere plot and action." (Think Holmes) (A copy of this article is now in the SOB Lending Library.)
- From SOB Terry Burns: The item mentioned on Page 4 of our October/November Ineffable Twaddle regarding hand-drawn "dancing men" cartoons is actually titled "Sherlockian Shtick". Caution: I bought it but found the cartoons a bit too strange. I donated it to the Club library so you can form your own opinion.
- From Peter Blau: Michael Kurland has edited an anthology of SHERLOCK new stories titled "Sherlock Holmes: The American Years" (\$25.95). One of the contributors, Steve Hockensmith, arranges a meeting between Holmes and William Gillette.
