Back to our study of The Canon in publication order, we'll revisit "The Valley of Fear"—one of only four novel-length Holmesian stories ACD wrote.

It is written in two (2) parts, of which we shall devote this visit only to "Part I: The Tragedy of Birlstone" and to the "Epiloque". Part I concerns Holmes' investigation of the alleged murder of John Douglas, which Watson places as having occurred in January at the end of the 1880s. The short Epilogue at the very end returns to Watson's narrative. We will skip entirely "Part II" of this novella—considered "the long boring part"!!




