
We'll also remember our fellow SOBs who have passed on before us...a solemn occasion but always a lovely spring day to share a stroll, a toast, memories and friends!!

Driving directions to the Annual Wreath Throw:

 If northbound on I-5, take Exit 103; follow Deschutes Way SW north (straight) for about one block to The Falls Terrace Restaurant on your right.

• If southbound on I-5, take Exit 103; stay straight to go onto 2nd Avenue SW, turn left onto Custer Way SE (which takes you back over Ì-5). Turn right onto Boston St SE, then left onto Deschutes Way SW. The Restaurant is on your left.

• The entrance to the park is on the south side of the Restaurant.

Member Review: "The Secret Files of Sherlock Holmes"

Is it worth your time and money? Find out what your fellow SOBs think!!

From Lauran Stevens of Seattle, WA: "The Secret Files of Sherlock Holmes" by June Thomson (1994).

Ms. Thomson is a noted British Holmesian who has written several mystery and crime novels. In this book, she tells how a man named Aubrey B. Watson acquired Dr. John H. Watson's famous battered tin dispatch box, which had for some time resided in the bank of Cox and Company at Charing Cross.

Aubrey Watson has decided to publish seven of the stories found in the box, which Dr. Watson withheld from publishing at the

time they occurred because Holmes had wished to protect the secrets of the people involved. Aubrey-now the owner of the contents of the tin box-feels that now the stories can be told.

Ms. Thomson writes in the style of Doyle, and the stories move along smoothly. The seven tales involve a missing fiancé, an odd worm, a wayward son, a Duchess in distress, a canary trainer, a discerning burglar and a mysterious lighthouse.

Although these stories are not part of the Canon, you could imagine that they would fit into it very nicely. The stories are inventive and, if fact, quite a jolly good read.

Librarian's Corner

"It is a great thing to start life with a small number of really good books which are your very own." Sir Arthur Conan Doyle

Our two library boxes are filling up. SOBs have donated quite a few books and tapes in the past couple of months. Here is a brief list of what's new.

⇒Uncollected Stories of Arthur Conan Doyle, ed. Gibson and Green, 1982. Here are 33 non-Sherlockian stories, from "The Mystery of Sasassa Valley" (1879) to "The Last Resource" (1930). How about "An Exciting Christmas Eve, or my Lecture on Dynamite"? One Club Member said these stories are good.

⇒The Whitechapel Horrors: A Sherlock Holmes Novel by Edward Hanna. 1992. You guessed it—Sherlock meets Jack the Ripper.

⇒Two Mycroft Holmes mysteries by H.F, Heard, A Taste of Honey, 1942, the first in a series of three, and Reply Paid, 1942, the third in the series (the second, The Notched Hairpin, hasn't come into the library yet). Mycroft meets one of the most sinister murderers of all time in **Taste**, and in **Reply Paid**—well, you can find out! Two for our kids/grandkids, or those who just like children's literature, here are:

⇒ Eye of the Crow: The Boy Sherlock Holmes, His First Case by Shane Peacock, 2007, the first entry in the author's boy Holmes series. This book gives a very new take on Sherlock's childhood and entry into the detecting and justice-serving field. I'm not sure of the concept, but I liked the book.

⇒The Strange Adventures of Charlotte Holmes by Hilary Bailey, 1994. Here are stories of six of Charlotte's (SH's sister) cases, from a boy missing from a Victorian male brothel to a secret room in Glamis Castle. Charlotte's friend and advisor is, you guessed it, Mary Morstan Watson. I'm looking forward to this one.

 \Rightarrow We even have a copy of the magazine, **The Sherlock Holmes Gazette**, 1996, most of which is dedicated to articles about The Hound.

• From Editor Terri:


