jollification, leaving out the usual Victorian pathos and orphans. Instead we are treated to a merry jaunt through London as Holmes reverse-engineers a treasure hunt for the eponymous stone, solving the mystery but letting the culprit go. His forgiveness carries a light-hearted tone:

"After all, Watson," said Holmes, reaching up a hand for his clay pipe, "I am not retained by the police to supply their deficiencies.... I suppose I am commuting a felony, but it's just possible I am saving a soul."

SOB Kris Hambrick's Sherlock on Screen:

The Adventure of the Blue Carbuncle

First, a correction: I have learned that the majority of Eille Norwood films, which I believed lost, are actually owned by Sir Andrew Lloyd Webber. (The fact that he's not made them available to the public despite the other things he's foisted upon us lately is a subject for a late night rant, perhaps, that you'll probably regret triggering.) But there you have it—there is a possibility that they will, one day, be seen again.

On to the Christmas Special before there were Christmas Specials! Which begs the question that the internet is not fighting about: Is "The Blue Carbuncle" a Christmas story?

One big mark against it is that it was originally published in *The Strand* in January. But that's merely one year and, at any rate, certainly it takes place near Christmas. No one dies--except the goose, but a goose dinner is classic Victorian Christmas fare. And after a brisk chase about the frozen streets of London, we end up back at Baker Street, with a guilty man shown mercy and an innocent man, one hopes, eventually set free.

But I think the chief reason it's considered a Christmas story is that we like having that tradition. Charles Dickens has forever imprinted the Victorian era as our Christmas aesthetic, and indeed the Granada film takes this even further by setting the date just *before* Christmas and upping the ante on John Horner's story, complete with a dramatic prison release on Christmas Eve. (That the original airdate was summer is odd, but beside the point...



much like Bruce
Willis' "Die Hard".)







CDC Lab Testing Confirms Cause of Melioidosis Outbreak

I was listening to "Wait, wait don't tell me" on Saturday (an hour -long weekly news radio panel show produced by WBEZ and-National Public Radio in Chicago) and heard this news. Incredible!

I thought this sounded like the "Devil's Foot" too.

An online article related that, "The CDC is continuing its investigation of two deaths caused by a contaminated aromatherapy room spray sold at Walmart and other retail and online stores... with a "rare and dangerous" bacteria that could lead to a fatal medical condition called melioidosis.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) initiated an investigation of four melioidosis cases in Kansas, Georgia, Texas, and Minnesota presumed to be caused by the one strain of B. pseudomallei. After the investigators tested the water, soil, and products inside the homes of the patients, the investigators discovered the bacteria in a Better Homes and Gardens room spray. The discovery triggered a nationwide recall. "

Center for Disease Control Press Release For Immediate Release: Tuesday, October 26, 2021

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) today confirmed that bacteria in a Better Homes & Gardens (BHG) aromatherapy spray in a Georgia melioidosis patient's home genetically matches the bacterial strains in the patient, and three other patients in Kansas, Minnesota, and Texas infected since March.



CDC announced Friday that a bottle of the BHG aromatherapy spray in "Lavender & Chamomile with Gemstones" scent had tested positive for Burkholderia pseudomallei, the bacteria that causes melioidosis. But the final step in the investigation, being reported today,

was to confirm the DNA fingerprint of the bacteria in the spray and in the patients was the same. This allows CDC to confirm the spray or one of its ingredients caused the four melioidosis infections... Said Inger Damon, MD, PhD, director of CDC's Division of High-Consequence Pathogens and Pathology. 'CDC scientists and our partners found the proverbial needle in the haystack.'...

Anyone who has a bottle of BHG Lavender & Chamomile Aromatherapy Spray with Gemstones or other scents in the same product line purchased from Walmart online or in these Walmart stores (external icon) between February and Oct. 21, 2021, should stop using it immediately and follow the steps listed on CDC's website to safely return the product to Walmart. CPSC and Walmart recalled about 3,900 bottles of aromatherapy spray on Oct. 22,...."

Adds Margaret: Also a good way to knock off your relative; ACD would have used this for sure! • Too much transfer of material from continent-to-continent with resulting contamination of the environment? • On a serious note, read about how the CDC wants to make sure it will not contaminate soil and water here!!! Hope they can catch it in time.





But if you'd like to get really festive this season, I can recommend two other versions: the **1968 Peter Cushing BBC** and the 1980 Belarusian production starring Algimantas Masiulis, both available on YouTube. Now, the latter is not subtitled, but the familiar plot points are easy to follow and they've added some truly bizarre elements such as a wandering



chorus, a gang of colorful criminals, and Holmes himself singing while wearing a fez. Even without an official celebration of Christmas, this Soviet-era contribution manages to find the festive spirit of the time.

In the true spirit of the season, the BBC version actually grants Watson an observational acumen the original denies him: Instead of seeing nothing of consequence in Henry Baker's hat, Watson is actually able to determine a great many of the details previously derived by Holmes.

And I think the gift of a clever Watson is as good as any a Holmesian can ask for!

A Book Review

SHORT AND SWEET: A CHRISTMAS TREAT

A Christmas Carol at 221B by Thomas Mann

A dandy Doyle-like start on Christmas Eve 1894 as the Boys enjoy a fire in the hearth, safe from the raging winter tempest outside, with Holmes relaxing after returning from the Great Hiatus and Watson penning "The Singular Affair of the Vendetta of the Red Centipede," which Holmes forbids him to publish.

After reminiscing about a few of Watson's previous Christmases and drinking a toast to the recent, sad passing of Mary Morstan Watson, the sleuth stuns the doctor by informing him of one of his ghosts from Christmas past: At the age of 23 he actually was with Ebenezer Scrooge on the Christmas Eve day of his death at the ancient age of 95.

Holmes rarely talked about his past, but tonight he begins a tale in which he met Dr. Timothy Cratchit of the Marley Clinic on December 23, 1877. It seems that Scrooge was the benefactor behind the many clinics, hospices and hospitals bearing the name of Morley. The detective then spins the tale of his experience involving the old hiss-er of "Humbug," his inherited family and generations of Cratchits, as well as an old school chum of Holmes who recalled his skills at detection and deduction. The resident of Montague Street uses these abilities as well as his knowledge of chemistry and other things to help keep Eb from being swindled out of the properties he established. Holmes never felt his

efforts in this little problem to be particularly noteworthy, and so he had never informed Watson of this earlier "case."

COOK'S NOTE 1: Watson's manuscript of this short tale was discovered in the Library of Congress by the author of The Oxford Guide to Literary Research.
